Neighbourhood Plan

Cotterstock Crossroads

Following on from continued concerns regarding road safety at the Cotterstock Crossroads, NNC/Kier have proposed the introduction of a new speed limit. This proposal is to extend the 30mph speed limit on Main Street, from Cotterstock village up to the crossroads. The remaining roads at the junction will remain at a 40mph speed limit. This is at the consultation stage and the timetable for its introduction is to be confirmed.
